# Hybrid Programming



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



## My Interview with Lauren Frary by Clifford Leon



### 1. What was your first job at The Arc of Somerset County?

"I started when I was in my 20's as the Respite Home Manager. Every opportunity I was offered, I took. I was then able to work in many departments such as being the Assistant Director of Residential Services, Director of Employment Services and many others! I eventually worked my way to become the Executive Director - the Board gave me this opportunity and I am grateful for that. I have worked in every department except for in maintenance - Jason, I might come back to work in that department someday...kidding!"

### 2. What's your greatest successes and accomplishments working at The Arc of Somerset County?

"One of the things that I am most proud of is building a very, very strong leadership team. We have some really amazing directors who really lead the agency to be a stand out organization in disability services. The other thing that I am proud of is finding and creating opportunities for people with disabilities to participate in areas where they were not able to participate before to include The Achievement Center at RVCC and other unique programs that we have created."

## 3. Is there a colleague or colleagues from work that has inspired you in your life?

"First of all, I am inspired everyday just by the people we support and serve and families we interact with- they are my greatest inspirations. Chris Corvino is always an inspiration for me as well as all of the staff in the agency."

### 4. What will you miss most about The Arc of Somerset County?

"I will miss visiting the programs and seeing everyone in their day to day lives. I will miss our events where I get to meet the people who support us and I think that I will miss, again, all of the directors and staff I have worked with - all in the agency are amazing people."

## 5. How have you evolved as a person working for The Arc of Somerset County?

"I have become stronger in terms of my own convictions surrounding our mission. I have evolved into a better leader and I have grown to really appreciate the community and all it has to offer and how our community here at The Arc of Somerset County makes such a significant difference for the larger community in which we live - our community reaches out to support the larger community. I have learned this throughout my 32 years here."

### 6. What message would you give the person taking your place?

"When you act from a place of integrity and a place that your heart tells you to go, then things will always work out. You also have to take risks when working at a non-profit, so take those calculated risks so that we do not miss any opportunity to enhance the lives of those whom we serve."

## 7. What's the most valuable lesson you have learned from your co-workers?

"I have learned two things...one, do not be afraid to say "I need help" or "I do not know". You cannot get the help or information if you do not have it - I learned that very quickly. Also be the first one to say, "I am sorry."

### 8. How do you see The Arc of Somerset in 10 years?

"I am so excited about the future of The Arc of Somerset County especially where we are at the brink of 50 years of service and another 50 years coming up, new leadership and a new strategic plan. I see the agency really branching out to include new services such as therapeutic services, Camp Jotoni to expand to provide year round programs, The Achievement Center at RVCC growing as well as finding the people whom may have fallen through the cracks and providing support to those individuals."

"Inspirational"

"For the short term, I am going to spend a little bit of time recentering myself, with my children and doing my favorite thing - climbing on rocks or mountains! # Craftsman Corner

### Helpful Tips to Save Energy & Keep Cool During the Summer Season

Well, the Summer is here! It sure does feel like it, right?? Now is the time to remind ourselves some of the things we can do to help keep our homes and buildings as cool as possible! Here are some helpful tips to follow:

- Cracks around doors, electrical outlets, light switch plates and windows should be sealed. Eliminate air leaks around window air conditioners with foam insulation or weather-stripping. If you see areas that need attention submit a Property Work Order Request. Please be as descriptive as possible.
- Close blinds, shades and draperies facing the sun to keep out the sun's heat and help fans and air conditioners cool more efficiently. About 40 percent of unwanted heat comes in through windows.
- Ensure all windows are closed and locked. Some windows, if left unlocked, will be open just a few inches at the top of the window. It is hard to notice when a window is open at the top thus allowing for cool air to escape from the home.
- Even if you have air conditioning, use ceiling and other fans to provide additional cooling and better circulation.
- Turn off power sources. TVs, computers and other electronic devices draw power when they are in standby mode or turned off but still plugged in. Turn off your monitor when you leave your computer for more than 20 minutes. Screen savers use electricity and computer equipment emits heat.
- Keep air vents & registers clean. By doing so, this prevents dust build-up that will clog your HVAC (Heat Ventilation Air Conditioning) unit rendering it inefficient.
- In the summer months, run your washing machine, dryer, and dishwasher early or at night when it's generally cooler, if possible.
