The Page Turners Reading Group has been meeting in Branchburg every Monday morning since March. The program is designed to introduce topics that have lead to further discussion and inquiry as well as provide exposure to written materials in a way that is approachable. Topics have included thunderstorms, dinosaur bones, astronauts and animals at the zoo.

The group also emphasizes social participation. After each reading, the group talks about what the reading was about. They also answer questions

to work on recall and comprehension skills.

Individuals are encouraged to share their own interests in relation to the story or article being read. For example, when there was a reading that mentioned a train, someone in the group talked about the time she took a train into New York City. When the reading was about vegetables, the group named all the vegetables they could think of.

One of the standouts in the group has been Steve. When the group first started, his reading would be no louder than a mumble and not easy to hear. In the following weeks, he began to read louder so that everyone in the room could hear him. He also follows along with the reading and provides pronunciation help to others in the group if they get stuck on a word. Congratulations on this excellent work, Steve!

Decision Making Profile

The decision making profile creates a clear picture of how a person makes a decision and how they want to be supported in decision-making. It can help people to have choice and control in their lives. It describes how to provide information in a way that makes sense to that person.

This could be how they want you to structure your language, if they want written words, symbols or pictures or perhaps an audio format. On a page insert the following headings in 5 columns: How I like to get information, how to present choices to me, ways you can help me understand, when is the best time for me to make decisions and when is a bad time for me to make a decision.

Person Centered Thinking

Person centered planning rituals & routines. Rituals begin every day with our morning routines. Identifying the pattern of waking up and getting ready for the day is critical for individuals served. However, with people at your programs who may require assistance, that pattern of getting ready often changes with every change in staff. We first have to be aware of and respect what is important in their consumer routines of the day. We have to help create a routine that is meaningful to the person that we all know and all follow to provide comfort in maintenance and individual choice. For people who need assistance and support developing positive rituals must be a priority. For many people, these rituals will need to be developed with the assistance of staff and then supported by the staff at all levels.

Festival of the Trees

The Arc of Somerset County and Somerset County Therapeutic Recreation Department joined together to put on a wonderful performance at the Festival of the Trees at the Basking Ridge Environmental Education Center. Prior to the performance, the group practiced for three sessions at the Therapeutic Recreation Program during which they learned to play music using adapted hand chimes.
