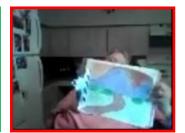

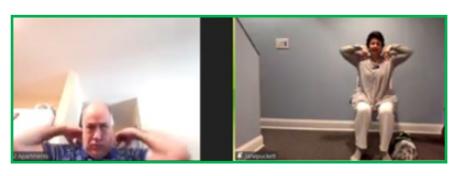

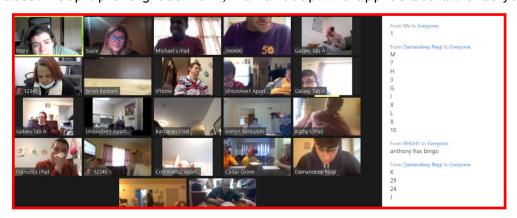






## Damandeep's New Role!

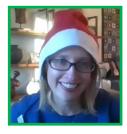






# Austin, Dylan & Eduardo

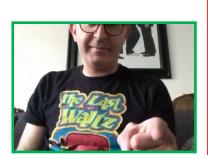




## **Hot TopiX**

# Craftsman Corner



Remember to remove all ice and snow from your vehicle before driving, especially from the hood, windows and roof. It's the law in New Jersey! Motorists who fail to do so face fines of \$25 to \$75 for each offense, regardless of whether the ice and snow is dislodged from the vehicle. If flying ice or snow causes property damage or injury to others, motorists face fines of \$200 to \$1,000 for each offense. There are approximately 500 fatalities in the United States per year due to icy road conditions.

#### WINTER DRIVING TIPS

- 1. Drive slow (at or below the posted speed limit) and adjust your speed for the changing road conditions.
- 2. Turn on your headlights, using low beams when traveling in snow.
- 3. Increase your following distance. In winter weather, travel at least eight to 10 seconds behind the car in front of you.
- 4. Give snowplows plenty of room to work. Don't tailgate and try not to pass. If you must pass, take extreme caution in doing so. Remember, a snowplow operator's field of vision is restricted. You may see him, but they don't always see you.
- 5. If you skid, don't brake or accelerate. Remove your foot from the gas, and gently steer your car in the direction of the skid (the direction the rear of your vehicle is sliding.)
- 6. When your car starts heading in the desired direction, carefully straighten the wheel. Slow down before exiting the highway. Exit ramps often have icy patches, sharp curves and stalled or stopped vehicles.
- 7. Have a personal safety kit easily accessible in your vehicle that includes: an ice scraper/brush; shovel; jumper cables or battery starter; blanket; sand, salt or kitty litter for traction; lock de-icer; flashlight and new batteries; extra windshield wiper fluid; safety flares/warning device; cell phone with spare battery; water and non-perishable food (i.e., granola or protein bars); and paper towels or a cloth.
- 8. If your vehicle does become disabled, pull off the road as far as possible and turn on your emergency flashers. Remain with your vehicle until help arrives. If you can't get your vehicle off the road and are uncertain about your safety, do not stay in your vehicle or stand behind it. Proceed carefully to a safe location away from traffic.

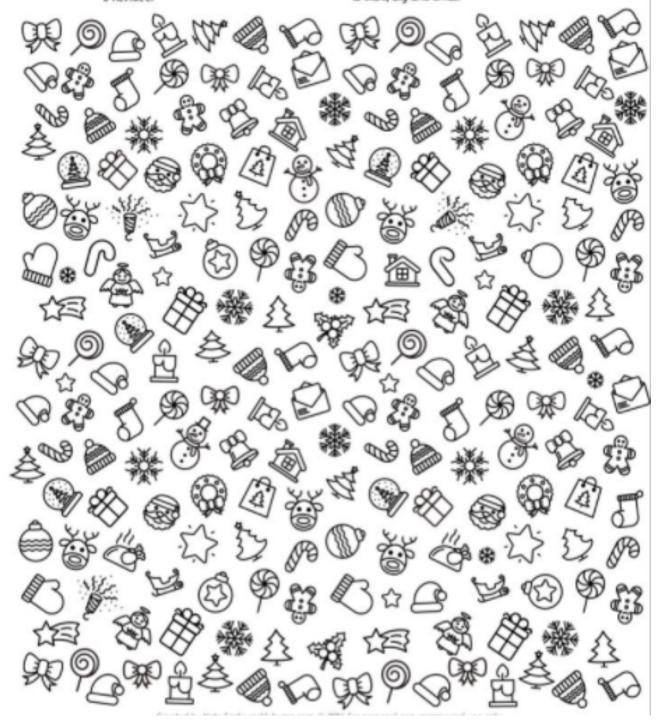

#### Holiday Visitation Plan for Licensed Community Residential Programs

#### Introduction:

The 2020 holiday season is upon us and, unfortunately, New Jersey is experiencing increases in COVID-19 positivity across the State. Many individuals, families and friends are inquiring about visitation for those who reside in licensed community residential settings during this time.

The Department of Human Services' Division of Developmental Disabilities (Division) supports an individual's right to engage with family and friends in visitation outside of the licensed community residential setting they call home, but is asking everyone to work together to help reduce the spread of COVID-19.

The virus that causes COVID-19 is easily transmitted, especially in group settings. Many residents of licensed community residential settings have underlying health conditions that make them particularly vulnerable to suffering the most serious complications of COVID-19 infection, including death. Additionally, those individuals who do not have underlying health conditions often reside with housemates or work with staff who do and who may un-intentionally expose them to the virus.

Therefore, the Division strongly recommends against individuals and the staff that support them from engaging in in-person holiday celebrations and gatherings with those they do not live with. As a provider of Residential Services under the NJ Division of Developmental Disabilities, The Arc of Somerset County will comply with and support The NJ DDD's guidance.

#### PLAN:

Families and friends who elect to take an individual off-site of a licensed community residential setting must contact and make arrangements with The Arc of Somerset County's Director of Residential

Services ( K. Kowalski). Any individual who attends an off-site celebration or gathering must be quarantined upon their return in accordance with CDC guidance as follows:

- a. The individual must be quarantined for 14 days upon return to the licensed community residential setting;
- b. If the individual resides in their own private residence not shared by another individual or lives in a residence with others but does not share a bedroom, they may be quarantined there. However, they should still be separated from other residents and not interact with them for 14 days. The capacity of an individual to comply with this must be considered;

c. If the individual has a bedroom shared with one or more individuals, they should be quarantined in an alternate location away from others for 14 days upon their return. Please note that this may not be possible in all instances;

d. If another location is not available, the licensed community residential provider shall notify the family that the individual will not be able to return to the program until an alternate location to quarantine for 14 days becomes available. All efforts shall be made to provide a timeframe in which another quarantine location may be available. In some cases, the residential agency may not be able to provide a realistic alternate location

#### Alternate Sites for Quarantine:

Alternate available space for Quarantine from approximately November 25, 2020 through January 15, 2021.

Currently the available space for quarantine includes 7 available spaces:

- · 5 bedrooms at RGH
- · 1 apartment at Commons II
- 1 bedroom/ bathroom combo at GGH

#### Reservations to take an individual served home:

Family, Friends or Guardian who wish to pursue and off site visit during the holidays must observe the following:

- Reservations to take a loved one off site will be based on a first come first serve basis
- Reservations will only be available based on the number of quarantine spaces available (7)
- Upon make a reservation the family, friend or guardian must provide the following within 36 hours of the visit:
  - o Dates and times of visit
  - Address of visit
  - Names of all other visitors that will be present at any time during the visit
  - Provide a 36 hours' notice of cancellation / change in plans before an individual is taken off site

#### Certifications:

The Individual, Family, Friend or guardian must sign a certification that outlines:

- Awareness of the possible dangers of exposure to Covid-19 for the individual/ family/ friend and those the individual resides with
- Agreement to follow making, social distancing, hand hygiene and cleaning/disinfecting of surfaces as per the CDC and NJ DOH guidance during the visit
- Agreement to notify the licensed community residential setting if anyone present at the holiday celebration and/or gathering tests positive for COVID-19 or exhibits symptoms within 14 days of the off-site visit.

### **Buzzwords**

- Understanding that the individual will be quarantined in their bedroom or an alternate location for 14 days upon return on the agreed upon date
- Agreement that if quarantine space is NOT available within the agency at time of the return date

   the family, friend or guardian will be required to care for the individual until room is available
- The agency reserves the right to request a negative Covid-19 test prior to an individual returning back to the agency

Further Guidance and/or increases in COVID-19 cases may alter this plan or prompt The Arc of Somerset County to cancel or disallow further visitations.



# A message from the Executive Director

As we enter into 2021, I want to extend my sincere gratitude to each and every one of our employees.
